Carlisle haec adnotat: *the whole of the word AVGVSTI was evidently intended to be engraved in one line, but on account of some mistake having been made, the latter part of it is erased, and continued in the line below.* Lysons (sive potius Bennet episcopus), cuius exemplum cum Hutchinsonis prorsus convenit, haec dicit: *on a close inspection of this altar, we perceived that it had originally been inscribed Discipulinae Auggg., the letters of the inscription being sharply cut and remarkably well formed; the two last G's had afterwards been effaced, and the usti in the last line added, to render it applicable to a single emperor; the letters of this last line are by no means so well executed as those of the original inscription. No doubt the three Augusti originally alluded to, where Septimius Severus and his two sons Caracalla and Geta. Contra Smith (quem Bruce sequitur) Augustum Hadrianum esse studuit demonstrare eo potissimum, quod *Disciplina Aug.* inscriptio in nummis eius tantum Augusti atque in Pii quibusdam reperiatur. Sed apparent aequo iure etiam aliorum imperatorum disciplinam militarem potuisse concelebrari; unde omnino recte iudicasse putandus est Bennet episcopus.*
