Goughs Camden 3 p. 425, 440; Maclauchlan memoir p. 85; Bruce wall p. 301), quibus secundum notitiae seriem fortasse tribuere

licet nomen Tunnoceli. Tituli vero perpauci iisque exilis argumenti inde prodierunt a BRANDIO descripti partim (n. 946, 947), partim ab A. W. FRANKS et BRUCIO (n. 948, 948a); servantur hi cum aliis aliunde collectis (unde alterius origo incerta est) in Lowther castle.

Addidi titulum singularem, qui repertus est in Glasson vico a Drumburgh versus occidentum sito (n. 946); sed servatur in Bowness.

946 A centurial stone was found, not long ago, at Glasson [s. Glasson], a mile west of Drumburgh. I saw it at Bowness Oct. 4th, 1783 BRAND. Bowness, built upside down into the wall of a lane, leading to the church BRUCE.

I saw (Oct. 6, 1783) a Roman altar, but without any inscription remaining, built up in the garden wall of Sir James Lowther's castle there. — I was informed that a remarkable lettered stone had been found there, in the garden of Sir James Lowther (now Lord Lonsdale) and removed to Lowther Hall.

947 From Drumburgh I brought away a curious lettered stone found there, and which the owner of the house, where it was built up, with great politeness suffered to be taken out of the wall of it; it is of red colour BRAND. Goughs Camden p. 425, 441; Hodgson 2, 3 p. 225 ss.; Maclauchlan memoir p. 87; Bruce wall p. 303), Ricardus BAINBRIGG iter suum vallense incepit (cod. mus. Brit. Cotton Iulius F. VI f. 300: I began mi iorney the XVth daie of August 1601 at the towne of Bulnes) ibique descripsit miliarium infra proponendum. Tituli reliqui ibi reperti non multi partim per editores HUTCHINSONIS innotuerunt (n. 949, 951, 952), a CLERK Scoto descripti, partim per BRANDIUM et LYSONS (n. 949)

et per HODGSONEM et BRUCIUM (n. 949, 939 a. 950). Cohortem incertam (n. 949) et legionem sextam memorant (n. 951). Reliqui sunt argumenti privati; alter eorum servatur hodie in Port Carlisle, qui vicus est ad portum situs hodie non infrequens; sed potest repertus esse in ipso Bowness.
