

**949** *Boulness, . . . an altar which is built up in a house belonging to one Mr. Lawson, about 16 feet from the ground CLERK apud HUTCH. At Boulness I saw a very curious Roman altar that some time ago was found in a field a little to south-east of the Roman station there, at present built up over the arched entrance to a barn in the village BRAND. Rep. a. 1739; Mr. Lawson placed it over a barn door fronting the street ROUTH apud GOUGH. Over the door of the barn of John Hodgson HODGS. Over a stable door in the middle of the town BRUCE. Est arula alta ped. 1 dig. 3, lata dig. 10.*

**951** *Some days before I came to Boulness [a. 1739], there was a stone found about 10 inches square; . . . the stone being of no great weight, I gave my landlord a shilling for it, who had it in his dyke, and took it away with me CLERK apud HUTCH. Numerus VI intra sertum positus est.*

**952** *There was lately dug up at Bowness, in Cumberland, very near the western extremity of the Picts wall, and the most western station thereon, a red freestone, about 3 feet long, 16 inches broad, and 2 inches and a half in thickness, with the inscription following, in Roman capitals:*

ONIANVS DEPIC  
SED DATE VITE IVRA QVARTVS  
SVPPLREAT VOTIS FIDEM  
5 AVREIS SACRABO CARMEN  
MOX VIRITIM LITTORIS  
VENVSI

*There are fragments of another line at the top and probably there may have been several more, as it is impossible to ascertain what length it may have been when entire.*

Hutchinson Cumberl. 2 p. 486 (inde Hodgson 2, 3 p. 227 qui addit: of which I could find no trace nor recollection among the people of Bowness) ex ephemeridibus the Cumberland Packet; editores adnotant: we cannot vouch for the accuracy of the above inscription, as we have not had an opportunity of examining the original.

## LIX. NETHERBY.

A Luguvallio (cap. LV) viam Romanam eam, quae ex regionibus Brigantum versus septentriones ducebat cuiusque mansiones itinerary seruavit (p. 467, 1 ss.), trans valli lineam magis etiam extensam fuisse indeque stationes, quae post Luguvallium sequuntur, Castra exploratorum, quae inde distabant m. p. XII, et Blatum Bulgum (sive burgum) totidem m. p. ab hoc remotum, quaerendas esse in Cumbriae regione maxime septentrionali et in Scotiae partibus finitimis consentaneum est videnturque ipsis viae vestigiis confirmari. Horsleius sane (p. 409) vestigia satis certa esse affirmat itemque m. p. fere XII a Luguvallio, ubi Castra exploratorum quaerenda sint, eius viae lineam incidere in castrorum reliquias conspicuas ad Netherby sitas, quas Camdenus (ed. VI p. 643) propter Esk flumen nomine Aesicae (supra cap. L) fuisse suspicatus erat perperam. Horsleium secuti sunt antiquarii Britanni quod sciam omnes (Stukeley it. bor. p. 58; Goughs Camden 3 p. 449; Hutchinson Cumberl. 2 p. 533 ss.; Hodgson 2, 3 p. 249; Bruce wall p. 355 ss.). Netherby vicus sedesque est gentis Grahamorum, a Longtown versus septentriones, versus orientem a Kirkandrews in ipsis castrorum Romanorum vestigiis sita Lelando (itin. 7 p. 69) iam notis; post a. 1725, quo Stukeley locum adiit, variis temporibus variae aedificiorum, ut balnei, parietinarum, anaglyphorum et operis tectonici reliquiae (inter alia signum Genii alicuius corona turrita ornati, fortasse castrorum, cf. Gordon it. sept. p. 77. 97 tab. 38; Horsley p. 272 Cumberl. 49; Hutchinson 2 p. 537 tab. 3 fig. 9; Lysons Cumberl. p. 154, 71; Bruce wall p. 358) lapidesque inscripti non pauci reperti sunt, quorum permultos ab interitu servaverunt loci domini inde a Roberto Graham ad eum, qui nunc vivit, Fridericum Ulricum (cf. Lysons Cumberl. p. 162; Bruce wall p. 426). Servantur ibi etiam lapides aliquot aliunde petiti, veluti Amboglannenses (supra cap. LII;

item n. 934) et Corstopitenses (supra cap. XXXIX); distinguuntur autem tituli illi externi a reliquis nullo negotio. Sed tituli numeri exploratorum ibi collocati mentionem nullam faciunt; faciunt cohortis I Aelia Hispanorum, quam supra iam Uxelloduni (cap. XXXIII) habuimus, itemque cohortis I Nervanae Germanorum (n. 953). Illam saeculo sane tertio in Netherby castra habuisse docent aedificia ab ipsa extracta (n. 964 cf. n. 954. 963? 965. 966. 967?). Hadriano imperante legionem secundam ibi quoque in castris muniendis fuisse occupatam ex titulo n. 961 discitur; praeterea etiam sextae legionis vexillationem (n. 968) et cohortes centuriasque incertas (n. 968. 971) simili operi intentas ibi fuisse appareat. Itaque cum exploratores non in ea sola statione, sed fortasse per castra limitanea alia complura dispositos fuisse probabile sit, nomen castrorum Netherbiensium prudentius erit in incerto adhuc relinquere. Castra vero exploratorum videntur quaerenda esse ad oram Esk fluvii prope Longtown et ad paludem the Solway moss (unde fortasse prorsus evanuerunt) ibi, ubi via Romana Luguvallio Blatum Bulgum fines Scotiae hodiernae tangit (cf. Roy milit. antiq. p. 118). Tituli in universum docent castra exigua non fuisse atque inde ab imperatore Commodo fortasse ad Alexandrum (n. 962—965) maxime floruisse; praeterea commemoratione digna non multa referunt. Continent enim deorum tam peregrinorum quam Romanorum dedications; tituli sepulcrales rari sunt (n. 672); classis Britannica ibi ut Amboglanna pedaturam videtur habuisse (n. 970).
