Emit Professor Mc Chesney, consul Americanus in Newcastle, misitque in patriam suam Chicago urbem ad museum ibi condendum, Glasgoiensibus frusta deprecantibus. In Chicago fortasse perit incendio nupero. Ectypum gypseum, quod Bruce faciendum curavit, servat societas archaeologica Glasgoiensis. Litterae in tabella ansata scriptae sunt.

XI. DUNTOCHER, STATIO PER LINEAM VALLI NONA?

Ab vico hodierno Duntocher versus meridiem in colle eminenti castorum vestigia certa observata sunt (Horsley p. 164; Roy p. 158; Stuart p. 295 s.); pontis etiam Romani, ut creditur, ibi supersunt rudera (Roy tab. 37. Tituli ibi aut in vicinia reperti (quibus additur originis non satis

certae unus, n. 1139) soliti vallenses tantum sunt (n. 1135—1138), uno excepto (n. 1134), sed tamen quin ibi statio fuerit non videtur dubitari posse. Unde Cibrae nomen ei stationi poterit tribui aliqua cum probabilitate.

1134 Duntocher; ara rep. a. 1829 by Archibald Bulloch, son of the old miller of Duntocher, while cutting drains in a marshy portion of the farm of Easter Duntiglennan, about $\frac{1}{2}$ mile north of the line of the wall, and in the vicinity of the fort. Servabatur a. 1843 on the top of the miller's cottage; deinde Glasgoviae apud Ioh. Buchanan; nunc ibidem in museo Hunteriano DICKS.
