**1169** Columna grandis (alta ped. 3 dig. 6, in circuitu ped. 5 dig. 7), rep. a. 1771 prope *Thurmaston*, (a hamlet of *Barkby*), not far from where the present road from *Leicester* to *Melton* (the great London road to *Loughborough* REYNOLDS) passed from *Fosseway*. Servabatur primum in *Thurmaston*, in the garden of the turnpike house near the place where it was found. Reperta est in loco antiquo; operae enim in via sternenda occupati offenderunt in a heap of stones set in lime, so hard as to baffle their eagerness to demolish it; id pro basi erat miliario. Delatum est ad *Leicester*, ubi extat in foro publico.

**1171** *These letters are on the side of a peice of a round pillar ffound att Ribblecester this last summer and seene by me the 12 of 9ber 1612, but ther is other letters theron which I cannot expresse, by reason of my unexperience in the kind of antiquities DODSW. Ribblechester; the form of this looks somewhat like a milliary pillar; it was lying in a garden at the west end of the town, and near the river. So much of the inscription is quite effaced as makes it hard to guess at the meaning of the whole* HORSL.

'I believe this inscription has not been published before, for I don't find it in Dr. Leigh's natural history' Horsleius; sed apud scriptorem illum p. 7 pilae alicuius miliariae mentionem fieri Gough observat.

'The letters at the bottom are so confused, I can make nothing out of them' Horsleius, qui initio aut Commodi aut Caracallae nomina latere posse putabat. Non sponderim eandem esse atque Dodsworthii; sed cum nulla praeterea Coccii innotuerit columna miliaria, neque obstant litterarum vestigia ab Horsleio visa, fieri potest ut eadem sit. Ante versus Horsleii tres ultimos spatium est versuum fere decem.
